COVID-19 RETURN TO SCHOOL PLAN 2021-2022

GENERAL COVID-19 GUIDELINES

Flint Hills Christian School will begin the 2021-2022 school year resuming normal daily operating procedures with the understanding that the potential spread of a contagious disease(s) may result in the need to amend the normal daily operating procedures. Amendment would be at the school Board of Director's discretion and occur as the needs and circumstances may dictate. (Updated 10/11/2021)

INSTRUCTIONAL MINUTES

The first day of school is August 18th for all students and the last day of school is May 19th. Ten minutes will be added to each day for PK-12 grade in order to increase the number of instructional minutes over the year. The purpose of this is to prepare for any possible unforeseen closures. The newly updated time for the school day is 8:10 am - 3:30 pm.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

FHCS will follow the existing attendance policy detailed in the parent student handbook. If a student requires an extended quarantine from school, administration and teachers will work with the student to ensure academic success is achieved.

SCREENING STUDENT HEALTH

FHCS expects that parents will monitor their child(ren) for illness and keep sick children home. Utilize the communicable disease form located at the end of this document for signs and symptoms of contagious diseases and the need to keep children home.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

FHCS Special Education program is offered through USD 383 and students receiving services may have additional guidelines or expectations to follow while receiving their service.

KEEPING STUDENTS OR EMPLOYEES HOME

If a known or unknown contagious disease occurs, a student or employee must stay home if he or she has a temperature at or above 100.0 degrees Fahrenheit. Students and employees must be fever free without fever-reducing medication for 24 hours prior to returning to campus.

If a student is absent three consecutive days, a doctor's note and/or consultation with the school nurse will be required to return to school.

If a student becomes ill at school, the student must be picked up within an hour of parental notification.

COVID-19 TESTING

POSITIVE TESTS

If a student or employee tests positive (regardless if vaccinated or not) they are to remain in isolation for 10 days after onset of symptoms **OR** 72 hours after fever is gone without the use of fever reducing medication **AND** there has been a significant improvement in symptoms; *whichever of these is longer*.

Employees or students may return sooner if clearance by a physician or county health department is received.

Any employee or student that has tested positive within the last 6 months of an exposure will not need to quarantine if they remain asymptomatic. If symptoms begin, the employee or student will need to follow quarantine requirements.

Antibody testing will not be accepted for admission back to school.

NEGATIVE TESTS

Unvaccinated employees and students that have been exposed to a positive Covid-19 case must quarantine per county requirements.

Option 1 - As long as the employee or student remains asymptomatic, they will need to quarantine for a minimum of 6 days and then may obtain a PCR test on day 7. If the test is negative, employee/student may resume normal activities on day 8.

Option 2: If the employee or student choose not to be tested, they must remain asymptomatic and quarantine the full 10 days and can resume normal activities on day 11.

Option 3 - If the employee or student is asymptomatic, they may obtain a daily covid test. If test is negative, they may continue in-person learning. Test must be taken the morning of returning to school and must continue to take a daily test through day 7. Employee and student's parent(s) are responsible for all costs associated with testing. If using a home test, email a photo of home test results to the office. If obtaining a test from the health department or a clinic, bring in copy of test results. If employee or student becomes symptomatic, they will need to follow close contact quarantines.

VACCINATED INDIVIDUALS

Any employee or student that is fully vaccinated (have received the second dose of a 2-dose series and two full weeks have passed or two full weeks have passed since the injection of a 1 dose vaccine) does not have to be quarantined if they are asymptomatic. If the fully vaccinated employee or student develops symptoms, they must follow the above information.

FAMILY TRAVEL

FHCS will follow KDHE guidelines on travel. If traveling to an area in which KDHE has mandated as a "Covid-19 hot spot," the parent(s) will need to contact their county health department and their student(s) may be required to quarantine for up to 14 days.

ATHLETICS

FHCS will follow KCAA guidelines in regards to athletic events. All practices will operate under normal operating procedures.

DIARRHEA <i>Watery stools</i>	Variable	Variable	Exclusion from school until 24 hours after the last episode
FIFTH DISEASE <i>Fever and headache followed by a red rash to the face, trunk, arms, and/or legs</i>	4-21 Days	Greatest before onset of rash and while fever is present	Must be fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medication
HAND, FOOT, & MOUTH <i>Fever, malaise, and sore throat. One or two days after fever starts, painful sores or blisters can develop in the mouth, hands, or feet.</i>	3-6 Days	While fever is present	Must be fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medication
IMPETIGO <i>Pus filled sore that may have a honey colored crust</i>	2-10 Days	Until lesions are healed	Exclusion until 24 hours after initial dose of prescribed medication and lesion is to remain covered until healed.
INFLUENZA <i>Fever, cough, nasal congestion, body aches, fatigue,</i>	1-4 Days	One day before symptoms develop and up to seven days after onset of	Must be fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing

LICE <i>Tiny insects that can cause scalp itching and irritation. Lice eggs (nits) appear on hair shafts</i>	Variable	Until lice and nits are removed	Live lice: Exclusion from school until treatment is received
MONONUCLEOUS or EPSTEIN BARR VIRUS (MONO) <i>Fever, extreme fatigue, sore throat, headache, body aches, swollen lymph nodes in the neck and armpits, swollen liver or spleen, and rash.</i>	30-50 Days	Prolonged – may persist for a year or more	No exclusion required. Recommended to avoid strenuous activity and contact sports for three to four weeks after the onset of symptoms.
MRSA (Methicillin Resistant Staphylococcus aureus) <i>Skin infections that resembles pimples or boils, which can be red, swollen, painful, or have pus or other drainage</i>	Variable, but commonly 4 to 10 days	Active non-treated drainage is infectious	Exclusion from school until medical treatment is received and lesion is to remain covered until healed.
PINK EYE or CONJUNCTIVITIS - <i>Bacterial: pink or reddened sclera, discharge, crusting, itching, painful</i> - <i>Allergic or viral: watery discharge, itching</i>	1-3 Days	During course of active infection	Bacterial: Exclusion until written permission is obtained from a physician to return to school Allergic or Viral: may stay in school
RINGWORM <i>flat, spreading</i>	4-14 Days	As long as lesions are present	Exclusion until medical treatment

SCABIES <i>Intense itching and a pimple-like rash, which can include tiny blisters and scales caused by tiny mites that burrow under the skin</i>	2-4 Weeks first time. 1-4 Days subsequent times	Until mites and eggs are destroyed	Exclusion until 24 hours following initiation of appropriate antiparasitic therapy.
STAPHYLOCOCCUS AUREUS (STAPH) <i>Skin infections that resembles pimples or boils, which can be red, swollen, painful, or have pus or other drainage</i>	Variable, but commonly 4 to 10 days	Active non-treated drainage is infectious	Exclusion from school until medical treatment is received and lesion is to remain covered until healed.
STREP THROAT <i>Throat pain, red and swollen tonsils, sometimes with white patches or streaks of pus, swollen, tender lymph nodes in neck, fever</i>	1-3 Days	As long as bacteria are present in respiratory secretions. Noninfectious after 24 hours of treatment	Exclusion from school until 24 hours after medical treatment and 24 hours fever free without the use of fever reducing medication.
VOMITING <i>Involuntary expulsion of gastric contents through mouth</i>	Variable	Variable	Exclusion from school until 24 hours after the last episode
